



Minnesota Waterfowl Migration and Hunting Report, Sept. 27, 2018

The following report is a compilation of state and federal wildlife manager reports and waterfowl surveys from across Minnesota. This is the 2nd report for 2018. Reports will be compiled weekly throughout the hunting season and should be available by Thursday afternoon each week. The Conservation Officer Report, available on the DNR web site, also contains information about waterfowl hunter success across the state.

General: 27 September 2018


Duck hunters had a good opening weekend across the state. Blue-winged teal, wood ducks, and mallards were most common birds in hunters' bags in most areas; ring-necked ducks and green-winged teal were also common on some lakes.

The number of ducks/hunter at different locations across the state on opening day in 2018 compared to 2017 was: Lac qui Parle WMA (2.6 vs. 2.6); Swan Lake (Nicollet county) (2.0 vs. 2.0); Thief Lake WMA (3.3 vs. 3.5); Big Rice (Remer) (1.8 vs. 1.4); Big White Oak (2.1 vs. 1.9); Mud Goose WMA (2.7 vs. 2.2); Roseau WMA (2.0 vs. 2.4); Carlos Avery WMA (2.4 vs. 2.6); Canosia WMA (0.8 vs. 1.0). Both Thief Lake WMA and Carlos Avery WMA recorded their 2nd highest ducks/hunter on opening day on record while most other areas were above their long-term averages.

The number of state waterfowl stamps sold through opening weekend was 62,177, which was 4% lower than last year's total of 64,576 and the lowest number on record.

Water levels remain fairly dry in the northern portion of the state but good to excellent across most of the rest of the state. Many areas in southern Minnesota still have flooded areas in fields from the rains last week that should continue to be attractive to ducks. Small grain harvest is complete and some corn and soybean harvest has started.

Hunters should see increased species diversity this week as more migrant ducks move into the state. Green-winged teal, wigeon, gadwall, and redheads should become more common and larger numbers of ring-necked ducks should be present by next week.



The weather outlook for this weekend calls for highs in the 40s in northern Minnesota with lows near freezing. In southern Minnesota, highs should be in the mid 50s with lows in the 40s. The long-term forecast calls for daytime high temperatures to remain 5-10 degrees below average with considerable rain next week and some chance for snow in northern areas.

The waterfowl season in the Central and South zones closes on Sunday.

Bag limits are 6 ducks/day, with no more than: 4 mallards (2 hens), 3 scaup, 3 wood duck, 2 redhead, 2 canvasback, 2 black duck, 2 pintail. Mergansers: 5 per day, no more than 2 may be hooded mergansers. Bag limits for geese are 3 dark geese/day.

Possession limits: 3 times the daily bag limit for all migratory birds.

Shooting hours begin ½ hour before sunrise until 4 p.m. through Friday, Oct. 5 and until sunset the remainder of the season. Motorized decoys are prohibited statewide through Saturday October 6th and on state wildlife management areas the entire season. The sandhill crane season is open through Oct. 21 in the Northwest zone only. Bag limits are 1/day and a sandhill crane permit is required.

Open water hunting: On Lake Pepin, Lake of the Woods, Lake Mille Lacs, and Lake Superior, open water hunting is allowed as long as boats remain anchored. On the Mississippi River south of Hastings, hunting is allowed not more than 100 feet from any shoreline, including islands. Hunters should consult the 2018 Waterfowl Hunting regulations (available from license vendors or online at the [Minnesota Hunting and Trapping Regulations page](#) for additional details and regulations.

Safety Never Takes A Holiday: treat every gun as if it were loaded, be 100% certain of your target before pulling the trigger, wear your life vest, pay attention to other hunters and your hunting partners, and watch the weather.

The following is a summary of pre-season waterfowl habitat and hunting conditions from various reporting stations across the state.

Still good numbers and diversity of ducks in the area. Good opener weather without mosquitoes this year. Mostly NW winds this week and cool temps. Seasonal wetlands and flooded crop fields continue to hold some water but starting to dry out. River flows have increased since opening weekend, with the MN River in Henderson at minor flood stage forecasted through Saturday.</p> <p>Crop harvest is in full swing this week with many farmers switching to corn over beans which may not be sufficiently dry. Estimate 10-15% of corn harvested and 5% of beans.</p>	<p>No significant migration activity to report other than a notable increase in geese by opening weekend, presumably molt migrants returning to the area.</p> <p>Good numbers of blue-winged teal, wood ducks, and geese can still be found across the area and should continue to provide hunter opportunity. Scouting will be key as local birds will be spread out using newly-flooded areas and harvested crop fields.</p> <p>Forecast calls for continued cooler (seasonal) temps into next week with daytime highs in the mid 50's and lows in the 40's. Next week appears wet again with showers moving in by Sunday.</p>	<p>Opening weekend success was about average across the area. A good number of hunters were out and found a nice change from the typical 80-degree opener, with sunrise temps on Saturday in the low 40's. Per usual, Blue-winged teal made up the largest proportion of bag checks (55%), followed by wood ducks (15%), mallards (14%), redheads (9%), green-winged teal (5%), and ring-necks (2%). The Redhead proportion was a notable change as that species was absent in last year's bag checks.</p>

Forecast calls for a cooling trend through the next several days with WNW winds and highs in the 50s. Slight chance of precipitation. Little in the way of migration noted except for a few more geese the last couple days. Some more movement should be expected with the NW wind.	Opening day of the duck season was well attended by hunters. A lot of shooting noted by COs and hunters. Hunter success was good with most hunters taking some birds. Some limits.
